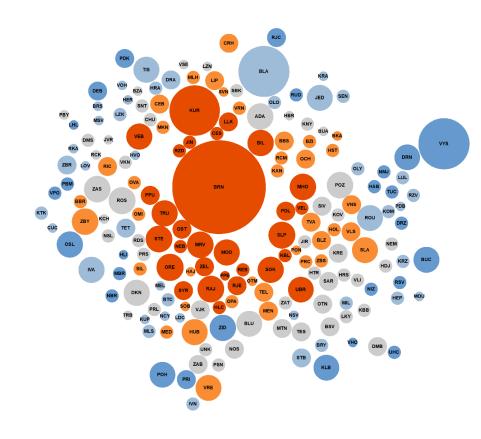

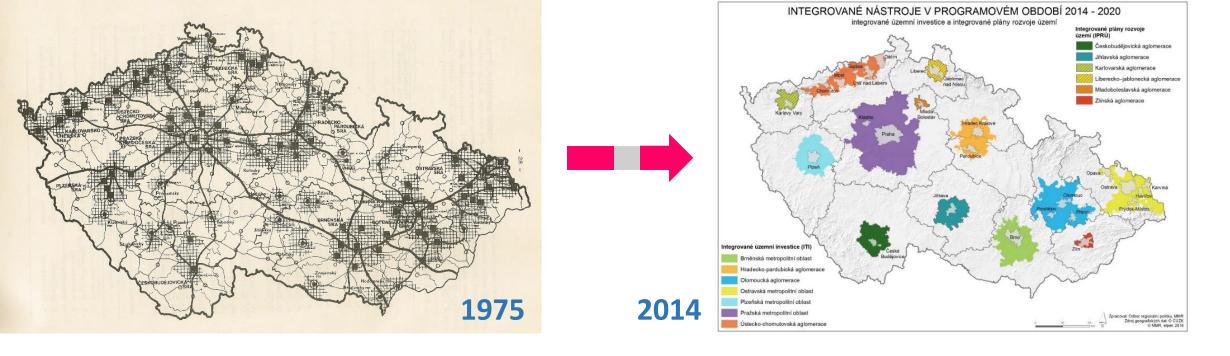
Go Beyond Your Limits Metropolitan Co-operation

Narative of Metropolitan Co-operation

- The City of Brno is THE LEADER in the current national discourse on metropolitan development
- The representations pursued by the city of Brno are anchored within the narrative of metropolitan cooperation (bottom up)
- The narrative refers to Brno metropolitan area and decision-making and planning mechanisms developed under the stimuli and influence of the EU Cohesion Policy and its instrument of ITI Integrated Territorial Investments (top down)

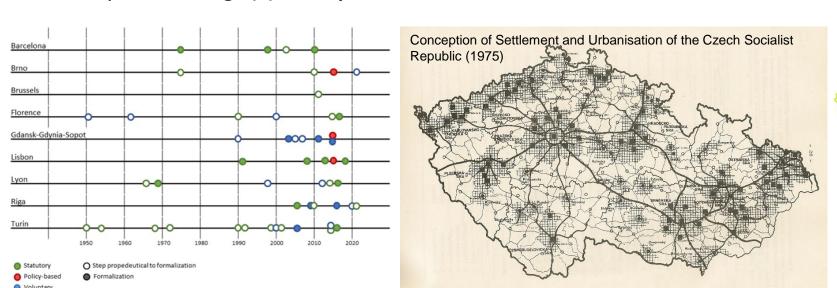

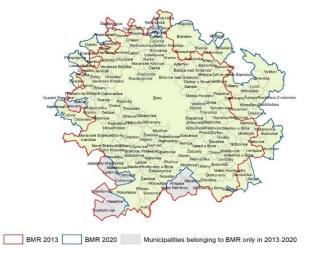


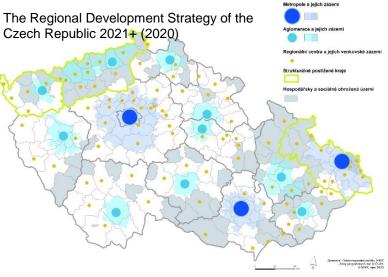
The Metropolitan Pathway

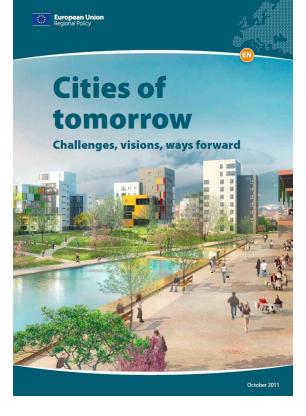
- 1975-1990: **centrally planned** urbanization: settlement and regional agglomerations
- 1990-2014: **decentralization** to municipalities (over 6 th. of local governments)
- 2014-2020: EU CP and the ITI instrument stimulated the establishment of metropolitan institutions, integrated metropolitan strategies with objectives of metropolitan development and provided funding to implement metropolitan goals (within the EU CP objectives)
- Since 2013: national Strategy of Regional Development and Spatial Development Policy acknowledge (3) metropolitan areas

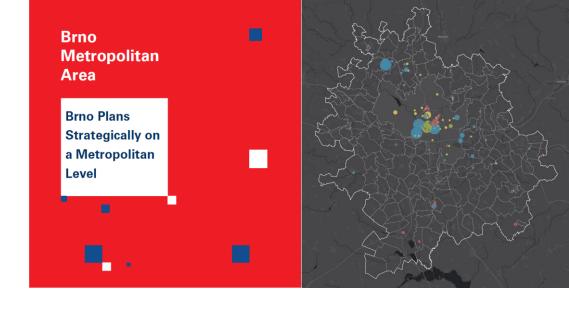


Brno Metropolitan Area: 2013-2020 and 2021+







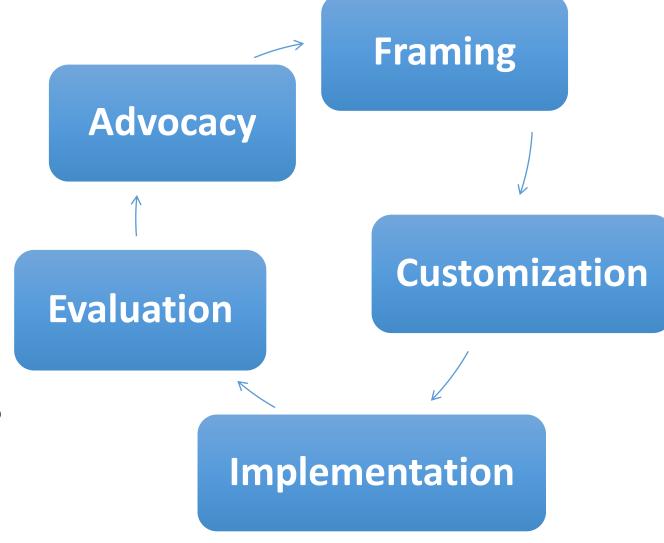


Metropolitan Performativity Concept, Practice, Outcome



Institutionalization pathway

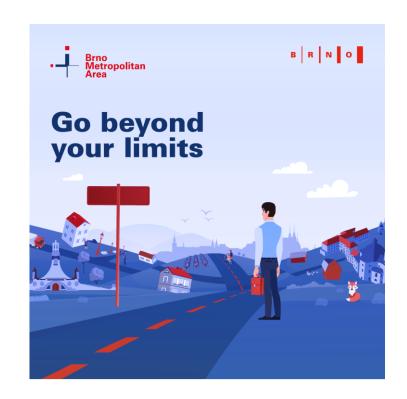
- Advocacy: EU territorial agenda
- <u>Framing</u>: Partnership Agreement, national Strategy for Regional Development, Methodological Instruction for the Use of ITI
- <u>Customization</u>: Integrated Strategy for BMA, Steering Committee and thematic working groups, Memorandum of Cooperation between Brno and 6 towns
- <u>Implementation</u>: Dialog with partners about metropolitan priorities, realization of integrated projects, building of metropolitan community, setting the cooperation
- <u>Evaluation</u>: Questionnaire survey among municipalities, discussion and reflection within the Steering Committee, decision to establish new metropolitan working group
- Advocacy: Position document of mayors of Czech statutory cities, series of metropolitan conferences organized by Brno
- <u>Framing</u>: national government requires wholistic Integrated Strategies, Brno widens the scope of metropolitan cooperation behind the ITI frame



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Learning pathway

- the implementation of EU CP since 2014 as learning process
 - initiation and establishment of metropolitan dimension in national policies metropolitan areas and major city regions as an integral and important part of national government regional (Strategy of Regional Development) and urban policy and spatial planning system (Policy of Spatial Development) – top-down policy making
 - the ITI instrument: initiation and establishment of mechanisms for governance and co-operation in metropolitan areas and urban regions (metro institution, strategy, objectives, funds) - bottom-up metropolitan development
 - external support for advocating for metropolitan dimension on the national level and activation on the local level (city and municipal governments) mutual recognition of synergies between top-down government and bottom-up governance
- path from discourse on the key role of metropolitan and urban regions (in the EU and national strategic policies) to metropolitan cooperation in practice (using the ITI instrument)
 - making sense to actors to engage in the metropolitan cooperation
 - materialized outcomes (from meetings and strategies to public transport terminals and social services)



2021+ Challenges Metropolitan Co-operation and/or Government Policy

Stimulus for 2021+

- motivation for the top-down national metropolization process
 - cities and their metropolitan and urban regions acknowledged and established as the key territorial dimension of nation development priorities
 - establishment of formal framework for metropolitan government/governance (key requirement for the establishment of metropolitan budgeting)
- activation of bottom-up metropolitan potential
 - ITI as a vehicle to provide cities with greater access to and responsibilities within the decision-making about the EU CP and its funds
 - enhancing participation and cooperation of metropolitan (local and regional) actors
 - thinking and acting behind the field of the ITI and the EU CP

The Challenge Towards National Metropolitan Coalition and Co-operation

- The metropolitan planning and governance is **primarily top-down driven**. However, it provides mechanisms that **enable bottom-up identification of development priorities that correspond to national and European goals**. The key **challenge is to strengthen and empower the institutional framework for local bottom-up initiative**.
- Missing mechanism that would guarantee the equal participation of municipalities (their local governments) in metropolitan governance (only fragment of local governments who are members of Steering Committees). The key challenge is to establish a subject that would enable voluntary participation of municipalities in bottom-up driven metropolitan cooperation, that will at the same time assure commitment and obligations towards the fulfillment of common metropolitan goals.
- Provided the metropolitan bottom-up governance is established as a structure/institution independent of the EU CP and national regional policies, the challenge will be to reconcile the national policy to metropolitan areas, which is now directed to areas delimited by the state, and bottom-up metropolitan initiatives that would be driven by a voluntary collaboration of municipalities, which does not have to correspond to the territorial scope of national policies.

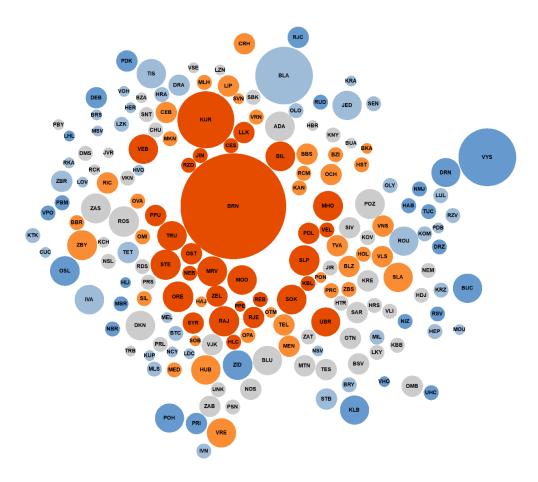
