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




To exploit outputs and results for broader impacts (downstream)



Vision for the fourth call

Increasing the <u>impact</u> of transnational cooperation projects in the regions

through

- Exploitation of existing outputs and results...
- ...in coordination with other EU instruments (beyond the Interreg bubble)



Coordination: Why and with whom?

 Projects developing European excellence, often not easily accessible for regions and their stakeholders (SMEs, public authorities, NGOs, ...)



- Projects funded by directly managed EU programmes (H2020, LIFE, CEF, ...)
- (Specific collaboration with DG RTD)





To focus the call

On the basis of an analysis of:

- Challenges and needs of the regions
- Potentials for exploitation and coordination



The analysis

STEP 1: desk

- Relevance to CE territorial challenges with a focus on demonstration effects
- Potential for synergies and impact
- Possibility of taking up results from other (R&D&I) projects



Identify thematically relevant clusters with a critical mass of projects

STEP 2: survey

- Involvement in (research) projects and level of research results up-take
- Interest in exploiting own results in coordination with (research) projects
- Need for support actions




Identify the <u>exploitation potential</u>, <u>interest and experience</u> with uptake of (research) results



Step 2: There is high interest in exploitation and coordination


Interreg CE stakeholders

- 1. Consider **coordination with (R&I) projects important** and want to exploit their results in coordination with H2020/FP7 projects, however...
- 2. The level of awareness about exploitable R&I results is low (with exceptions) and...
- 3. The level of uptake of R&I results from projects is also rather low


